# Firem'n chit - Ridge Field

- I will build a campfire only when necessary and when I have the necessary permits (regulations vary by locality).
  - 1. I will minimize campfire impacts or use existing fire lays consistent with the principles of Leave No Trace. I will check to see that all flammable material is cleared at least 5 feet in all directions from fire (total 10 feet).
  - 2. I will safely use and store fire-starting materials.
  - 3. I will see that fire is attended to at all times.
  - 4. I will make sure that water and/or a shovel is readily available. I will promptly report any wildfire to the proper authorities.
  - I will use the cold-out test to make sure the fire is cold out and will make sure the fire lay is cleaned before I leave it.
  - 6. I follow the Outdoor Code, the *Guide to Safe Scouting*, and the principles of Leave No Trace and Tread Lightly!

First Class 5d- Describe Extreme weather conditions you might encounter outdoors in your local geographic area. Discuss how you would determine ahead of time the potential risk of these types of weather dangers, alternative planning considerations to avoid such risk, and how you would prepare for and respond to those weather conditions
